**Walls**

Due to the hilly site conditions and the rural setting, walls are an important component of the design as they provide a material tie-in to the surrounding agricultural lands. Retaining walls are used to create outdoor rooms for individual units sited on hillsides as well as to differentiate the golf course from the adjacent residences. Wall heights have been restricted to a maximum of 6'-8"; where greater grade changes need to be accommodated, multiple lower, stepped walls, softened with planting, are used. Most site walls—retaining or free-standing—are to be constructed of local stone. Walls attached or immediately adjacent to buildings will be more architectural in character, with a concrete structure and veneered stone face. Walls located in remoter parts of the landscape will be rustic in appearance and construction; either dry-laid or with mortar deeply raked back (to appear dry-laid). In certain locations stone retaining walls give a uniform and distinctive character to the streetscape.
